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Mission Experiences in South Africa

Hey Team (and friends)!

I apologize since it has been almost two weeks since my last update - we have had very limited access to internet recently since we have been traveling quite a bit.

Late last night we returned from a quick two day trip to the Kingdom of Swaziland. Swaziland is a separate country bordered on all sides by South Africa. We traveled for the purpose of attending the wedding of two UJ-Bunting alums, but also had a couple other experiences along the way. We toured a Swazi cultural village where we watched some villagers perform a traditional Swazi dance; and the night before the wedding we ate at a traditional Swazi restaurant where those who were brave enough sampled some Ox tail. When our server was questioned as to what Ox tail really is, she said "You know the meat around the tailbone of an ox, that's it." It was delicious.

Last Saturday we had quite the day. In the morning we visited the Door of Hope orphanage, where we got to play with about two dozen babies, all under 12 months. After leaving the orphanage we traveled about thirty minutes to nearby Soweto, the largest township in the world. Townships are black communities that were built by the government during apartheid to segregate the black and white communities. Four male students who we have been ministering to joined us for the trip, and they served as our tour guides while we were there. In the evening we attended a professional rugby game, which was quite the experience.

One awesome story from two weeks ago. Yandisa, one of the UJ-Bunting staff guys, spoke out of 2 Corinthians 5:21 on Wednesday at LeLife (our evangelistic meeting). After the meeting I was speaking with "K" one of the students we have been spending time with for the past few weeks. As we are sitting there he looks at me and asks "So Phil, what did you think of the message?" I was immediately

During the week we worked on two projects. The first was renovating space in the Christian Education building of a Baptist church in Pascagoula where Camp Victor is moving. Currently, Camp Victor is in downtown Ocean Springs and it is a ministry that helps restore houses for people who don't have the means to do it themselves. Since Katrina, Camp Victor has been in an old sewing machine factory owned by the county. The county recently sold the building to a developer and Camp Victor has to move out. The second project was working on a lady's house in Moss Point, just north of Pascagoula. We grouted tile floor, installed laminate flooring, put in kitchen cabinets, and did some exterior work. The homeowner's name is Ann Williams and she was very grateful to us. Hopefully in a few months she will be back in her home.

It's hard to believe that nearly 6 years after Katrina some people are still not back in their homes. But through volunteer efforts, progress continues. Our group worked hard, but enjoyed the Christian fellowship of each other and getting to know folks in Mississippi.

There is still plenty of work to do in Mississippi and Moravians will continue to send work crews. We are looking forward to another trip next year. We thank Oak Grove and Fulp Moravian Churches and the Mission Society for their monetary support.

WESTPORT, Conn. (July 4, 2011) — Save the Children has made an urgent call to donors to provide life-saving help to thousands of children in Ethiopia, Kenya, and Somalia whose lives are at risk due to severe food shortages. The UN has called this East Africa's worst drought in 60 years.

"Large numbers of Somali refugees are fleeing conflict and drought in their homeland and walking to the border crossing point at Dollo Ado. From there, they are taken to nearby refugee camps in southern Ethiopia," reports Duncan Harvey, Save the Children's Deputy Country Director in Ethiopia.

"Eighty percent of the refugees are children and the majority of the remainder are women. Many arrive in Dollo Ado having walked for weeks. They arrive sick and hungry. Many of the children urgently need food. We are still in a position to avert catastrophe if we act now."



A deadly combination of failed rains and soaring global food prices has left more than nine million people living in remote areas across the region — more than half of them children — without enough food and water and at risk of malnutrition.

More than a quarter of children in the worst-hit parts of Kenya are now dangerously malnourished, and in Somalia malnutrition rates have reached 30 percent in some areas, making the Horn of Africa one of the hungriest places on earth.

Save the Children has already launched a major humanitarian response in Kenya, Somalia, and Ethiopia, feeding tens of thousands of underweight children, providing life-saving medical treatment, and getting clean water to remote communities. But with the situation worsening by the day — and no more rain due till late September — Save the Children urgently needs money to dramatically ramp up its response.

"Thousands of children could starve if we don't get life-saving help to them fast," said Matt Croucher, Save the Children's regional emergency manager for East Africa. "Parents no longer have any way to feed their children; they've lost their animals, their wells have dried up and food is too expensive to afford.

"We can stop this tragedy unfolding, but we only have half the money we need. We urgently need to raise the rest so we can save more children's lives."

Families have resorted to desperate measures to survive. In Somalia, thousands have left their homes in search of food, with malnourished children walking for days on end in searing heat and risking conflict to find help. Meanwhile, in Kenya, Save the Children has received reports of people feeding their animals the thatch from the roof of their huts in a bid to keep them alive, leaving families without adequate shelter. Many children are eating just a single bowl of porridge a day, missing out on the basic nutrients they need to survive.

taken aback, and I thought to myself, "Aren't I supposed to be asking *you* that question? Aren't I the one who is supposed to be initiating the spiritual conversations around here?" But as I gathered myself I recognized that this young man was taking a big step in asking me that question. He was being openly transparent with me and displaying that he was interested in spiritual things by seeking to engage in spiritual conversation. We began to dialogue about the message in general terms and 2 Corinthians 5:21 in particular. At one point he said the words, "That verse, to me, IS Christianity. It explains it perfectly." At this point it was clear that "K" had a clear understanding of the gospel, and when pushed to make a decision to repent of sin and trust in Christ he said "I think a lot about decisions before I make them, and I've been thinking about this decision [to follow Christ] a lot over the past weeks, and I don't think I should put it off any longer. I want to make this decision now. Over the last week God has been changing my life. I've gained knowledge about who this King is and I want life in his kingdom." It is incredible when it is evident that John 6:44 really is true: that it is God and God alone who draws people to Himself. It is so clear in "K's" words that it was the Lord who was working in his heart to bring him to trust in Christ as his King.

Last Friday we had separate Men's and Women's socials. The men heard a message about biblical masculinity, and one of the main takeaways was that true manliness is nothing less than authentic godliness. After the message we watched *Gladiator* and played video games. As for the girls all I know is that they did girly things, and from what I hear the female students from UJ-Bunting loved it. This was a nice change of pace from what we had been doing over the past few Friday Night Events.

This past Tuesday I had the privilege of spending some time studying the scriptures with "K" and "M," both whom have come to faith in Christ in the last three weeks. We looked at Ephesians 2:1-10. One nugget that both "K" and "M" took away was the surreal truth that we are not only saved *from* our sins, but we are actually adopted *into* God's family as sons and daughters. They saw this particularly in v.6 which tells us that in Christ we have a seat with God in the throne room of heaven. It has been amazing to see these two men quickly grow in their joy in the gospel.

This week is the last week of exams for students at UJ-Bunting. Many students have already gone home and many will be leaving this week. We are making one last push to recruit students to the winter camp [retreat] which is coming up this

Friday to Sunday. This weekend will be a



great opportunity for students to experience a lot of teaching and fellowship in a compact span of time.

After the end of the camp, our team will remain at the campsite for a few days and engage in some mercy ministry in the nearby township. We will be splitting our time between putting on a Vacation Bible School for local children and building a house for a local family. We will spend the last couple days of our time here in South Africa on a safari. We are excited about seeing some wild animals and getting to rough it a bit.

After this week on campus, a week at the campsite, and a short safari, we will return to the states! I can't believe that our trip is almost over, it has flown by!

I walked into a home once and the piano was covered in a mass of family photos beautifully framed. It was several generations of joy as so fluidly described at length by the woman of the house. We are more than willing to talk about that which is most important to us. It isn't a job, we don't need training, & need very little encouragement to talk about such things. My question then, is this ...Why doesn't this happen more often with Jesus?



"Jesus is the priceless treasure, the source of purest pleasure and friend to me so true" as the the hymn text goes. You can't hide it or keep it secret. The unsurpassable joy He brings to a heart and soul cannot be contained!

As the one person was digging; another looked for pearls; the 3rd sought fish in his net, each, through their active searching, found the treasure (Matt.13). And we are blessed to have scripture in our own language, so we can keep our faith in motion, and the treasure unfolding. Eureka!

The past year & 1/2 here has been about bringing forth the availability of scripture; regular, large, and giant print bibles. We've also added Bibles for different-aged children. Our Moravian Chicken Pie fundraising dinner brought \$1100.00! It was fun to see all the new faces in the church.

Camp at Gosling Lake has been quite exceptional this year; Jen Burtner from Staten Isl., a creative arts teacher, Sherry from Wisconsin, and 2 Moravian youth from NC; Becky & Bailey. They have also been of huge assistance in worship through music and childrens' church.
