***“Farm fresh” comes to New Philadelphia***

The “farm to table” movement comes a little closer to New Philadelphia this summer when our own farmer’s market is held each Thursday afternoon during July.



The Connections Ministry is sponsoring this project that will provide farm fresh produce to our community right here from the church lawn. Between 10 and 20 vendors are expected to participate each week.

In addition to fresh fruit and vegetables, other products will be offered on a rotating basis. These may include baked goods, pottery, jewelry and crafts. Prepared food also will be available each week from a food truck.

The New Philly Farmers Market will operate from 5p.m. until 7:30 p.m., capturing a cohort of folks traveling Country Club Road en route home from work. It provides us with yet another way to invite folks to our church campus.

Vendors will be asked to bring their own tents and/or tables, and there is a modest application fee. NPMC members who would like to donate produce or other items to benefit our local outreach projects may, at no charge, join the New Philly Growers. There is no fee for being a part of this group.

Join us in July, rain or shine, for good food, fellowship and the fixings’ for great meals at the New Philly Farmers Market.

Booth fees will be \$10 per week, paid through

PayPal. There is no application fee.

Vendors will provide their own tent (if you choose to use one) and at least 20lb weights for each leg. Vendors will be set up outside. New Philadelphia hosted the Intersynodal Conference for the Southern Province held in February. An intersynodal conference is typically a gathering of pastors and delegates from all congregations and fellowships within the province in the time between synods; this one was to examine possibilities for future ministry and mission in our church.



Synods held every four years include delegates from each congregation who are charged with examining and overseeing the spiritual and temporal affairs of the Province and its congregations and electing bishops and representatives to interprovincial boards and agencies. Intersynodal conferences are interim gatherings to examine ideas and issues that may become part of the discussion or decisions of a Synod, but usually do not involve voting for resolutions that direct the ministry and mission of the church.

Living the Essentials: Yesterday, Today & Tomorrow, this year's intersynodal gathering, was an examination of Moravian history, Moravian present and future directions for ministry and mission in the Moravian church. Practicing the essentials of faith in love and in hope that God creates, God redeems and God blesses us were at the center of our time at the conference with worship times, instruction time and idea-generating and discussion.

We heard from the Rev. Dr. Craig Atwood about the history of Moravian congregations and implications of that history for us now and in the future; we heard from the Rev. David Guthrie, President of the Provincial Elders Conference, about the state of our Southern Province congregations and important trends

in faith today, and we gathered and shared ideas and dreams using five-minute Imagine Talks and "open space technology" for the future Moravian church in preparation for the 2018 Synod.

## *Missions and Social Concerns*

Winston-Salem Rescue Mission: The Winston-Salem Rescue Mission was established approximately 50 years ago, in 1967 as a non-profit, Christ-centered ministry. The goal of their mission is to meet the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of hundreds of hurting people in the Triad area. As a non-denominational ministry, they provide services to anyone who calls for help regardless of race, religion, cultural or ethnic background. Mr. Ken Heater serves as the current executive director. Mr. Heater shared a very informative presentation along with a testimony from one of their graduate, Cary Burnette.

The mission provides three residential recovery programs for men including many veterans: *1. The mission located in Downtown Winston-Salem includes a 90-day residential recovery program for all clients that seek help. 2. A 1-year residential program which requires the clients to submit an application and be interviewed in order to be considered. This program is at Trade Street and has a capacity for 35 men. They have access to a computer lab and can complete their GED and do online college courses. This program is structured and instills discipline, accountability and work therapy. 3. A second 1-year residential recovery program is located on Alpha Acres in Yadkinville. This is 110 acre farm facility with similar concept to the Downtown location with emphasis on manual work.*

Mr. Heater pointed out the devastation of Homelessness and Addiction on the lives of individuals. Thus producing hopelessness and causing men to lose possessions, jobs, family and everything of value and of importance to them. The mission is faith-based in the belief that true change happens from the inside through a relationship with Jesus Christ. This message is combined with practical instruction and counseling to help individuals overcome their challenges and live successful lives once again. The programs include structure, rules, discipline, accountability, classes, chapel and work therapy, all applied with grace and care. The primary goal is to help residents become successful citizens again.

Cary Burnette, a graduate of the program gave his testimony. He was born into a middle class family, going to a private school when he became involved with drugs and alcohol which changed his life. After years of addiction he finally went to the Rescue Mission and reconnected with Jesus Christ. The mission helped him to overcome his weaknesses and reaffirm his faith. He was able to continue his education at Forsyth Tech and is now employed by the Rescue Mission. He also wrote a book on the importance of reconnecting with God.

The Rescue Mission's principle is, needs are met on three levels: *4. Physical needs – are met by providing food, shelter, clothing, health care, education, and work training and services that create a healthy and whole person. 5. Emotional needs – are met through counseling, addiction recovery programs and caring support. 6. Spiritual needs – are met through Bible study, chapel services, personal counseling and a call to Christian faith and practice.*

The mission also provides several Community Outreach services such as: *1. Free Medical and Dental Clinics (run by volunteer doctors, dentists and nurses) 2. Free Food Pantry (provides over 300,000 meals annually) 3. Free clothing ministry (through Thrift Store)* These programs reach 300 – 350 men per year. The Rescue Mission is a 501©3 organization that does not receive any Government funds. They are supported by many volunteers who have the vision of helping the most in need in our community. The Rescue Mission will be hosting a fundraiser on October 26, 2017 at the Benton Convention Center. The goal is to raise \$500,000. This fund will allow them to increase counseling programs – biblical and evidence based. It cost \$20,000 per year for each client.
