A Bit About Paul

I experienced this when my dad and I visited Spiez, Switzerland, where our Stutzman ancestors lived before coming to Pennsylvania in the 1700s for religious freedom. After checking into our hotel, we hiked up a hill to a pizza place. During the walk, the skies opened up, and it began to rain. "Just great," I thought. "I finally get to the Stutzman hometown, and it's raining!" It was Paul's pity party. But after we ordered our pizza, I noticed the rain had stopped, and the sun was shining. I left the restaurant, turned a corner, and saw the most glorious rainbow that I have ever seen in my life! Sometimes you have to get rained on in order to see something glorious.

This month we finish our journey through Lent. We have been figuratively walking with Jesus as he carries his cross up Calvary's hill. As Abby recently preached, the torture that Jesus experienced on Friday was horrific. I cannot imagine the despair and uncertainty that the disciples must have felt on Saturday. But everything changed that glorious Easter morning when Christ conquered death! The Lord is risen! I hope and pray that you experience the joy and new life that Jesus gives this spring!

I am looking forward to getting to know you in the months ahead. Here are a few things that help you to know me a little better. I grew up in Herndon, Virginia, and graduated from Bridgewater College in 2003 with a degree in Psychology and Philosophy/Religion. In 2009, I received an MA in Religion from Eastern Mennonite Seminary, and I expanded my Master's thesis for publication in 2011: *Recovering the Love Feast* (Wipf and Stock, 2011). I have enjoyed living in Win-

ston-Salem since 2015. Although my ministry background is in the Church of the Brethren, I have served in ministry at Clemmons Moravian and Hopewell Moravian congregations in the past 5 years. During this time I also completed courses from Moravian Theological Seminary and received training from the Center for Congregational Health to be an Intentional Interim Minister and a Church Consultant.

I have been truly blessed to be the father of two teenage children, Kaylee and Josh. Because I am a single parent, some Sundays the kids will be with me, and other times they will be with their mother. When I'm not wearing the figurative "pastor hat," I enjoy hiking with my kids, playing racquetball, guitar, drums, and piddling on projects around the house and the yard.

As I drove to church on March 2, my first Sunday at New Philly, a song from my playlist "randomly" came on the stereo: "You Make Everything Beautiful," by For King and Country. My sermon was focusing on times and seasons in life, and the words of the song fit the sermon perfectly. I don't know if your life feels stormy or serene right now, but I do believe that God's timing is perfect, and God's glory is breathtakingly beautiful. Sometimes we have to go through life's storms before we can see God's goodness and glory.


South Fork Ministry

Thanks to the generosity of our New Philadelphia Congregation, the first two projects of the year for the South fork ministry were a huge success. Our annual toothbrush and toothpaste collection for all of the South Fork scholars for Children's Dental health month was fantastic. We collected 600 large tubes of toothpaste and 120 travel size tubes. Our collection of toothbrushes was equally amazing with a total of 770 single brushes, and 150 multi packs. Dr. Allen was thrilled by our response. Our next project was filling spring break bags for 30 South Fork families. Because the Winston Salem Forsyth County Schools altered their calendar this year, spring break was earlier than usual so our collection of items came just as we finished our toothbrush and toothpaste

collection. But this did not deter the response from our congregation! Our bags contained: peanut butter, jelly, cereal, a box of granola bars, crackers, a 4 count of fruit cups, a 4 count of pudding cups, a box of instant oatmeal packets, a 4 count of microwavable Mac and Cheese, 2 cans of SpaghettiOs's, 2 packages of Ramen noodles, Apple Juice, and several extra items that members of our congregation added. Over 35 members contributed to these bags. This bags of food, compassion, and Jesus' love helped 30 families bridge the gap without food at school for about 9 days. Thank you to all who helped with both of these projects.

Several volunteers from New Philadelphia participated in Read Across America on March 5. We read to classes that day while volunteers across the country read to classes in their communities. Tamara asked the congregation for monies to help fund the South Fork Third Grade Book fair. At the event, all third graders hunt for a large Easter egg filled with candy from the Mast General Store, select a book to keep, allow one of our volunteers to put the scholar's name on a book plate for the front of their new book, and enjoy a few lemon Moravian cookies. Many of these scholars have few items that just belong to them and are quite thrilled to have a book to take home and keep forever. Putting their name in the book makes it extra special. On March 25th, David Stanfield, Marie Rodden, Frances Weaver, Janet Gardner, Sandra Chitty, Bill and Marla Sparks will be at South Fork for this fun activity.



Ongoing throughout the year are our Dolphin Dads: Bill Donald, Chris Rogers, and Jack Long who man the cafeteria once a month so that teachers get a lunch alone. Patrick Linville is tutoring 2 first graders this year and is encouraging them in their lessons plus their love of reading.

Stewardship Committee

We each completed a survey on Stewardship at NPMC and she provided results and a booklet with ideas for 4 themes of stewardship. The committee met in March and discussed the ideas presented and will choose a theme to share with the congregation. We will be doing a monthly Stewardship moment during Sunday service and may have Laura speak one Sunday or have a gathering where she can come and speak with the congregation on Stewardship.

We have two new at large members and are excited for what the year 2025 for Stewardship will be at New Philadelphia.

We would also like to thank those that completed and turned in your pledge cards. We received back 108 cards with a total of \$458,010 pledged for 2025.

Elizabeth Windsor Scholarship

The Elizabeth Windsor Memorial Scholarship was established in 1998 in memory of Elizabeth Anna Windsor. The scholarship serves as a living memory of Elizabeth and as an opportunity to encourage and reward outstanding Christian character and church participation.

Elizabeth Anna Windsor was born December 31, 1980 and died just short of her sixteenth birthday on October 11, 1996 in a car crash. She was baptized as an infant at New Philadelphia and confirmed with this confirmation text: Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart, and wait for the Lord. —Psalm 27:14. That text offered guidance in her short life, and she showed patience and perseverance even as she lived life exuberantly. Her sense of humor was contagious, her energy was inspiring, and her life reflected her strong faith in God.

Elizabeth was active in New Philadelphia's Youth Fellowship, Sunday-School, Vacation Bible School, the summer preschool program and the

nursery. She loved being in the Lenten production of The Velveteen Rabbit one year, the classic story of the transformation of a loved toy to a 'real' living creature. During Lent and Easter, we are reminded of her own transformation from this earthly life to new life.

In the summer of 1996, a Goal Setting committee at New Philadelphia on which she served suggested the creation of a scholarship to financially support and encourage our youth. In 1999, the year Elizabeth would have graduated from high school, the first scholarship was awarded. It is our hope that her Christian character, her love of life and her desire to encourage others will continue to be remembered and to inspire others as this scholarship continues to be offered for New Philadelphia Youth.




Our Holy Week Readings take place the week of April 13:
