Church Involvement Committee

The goal of the CIC committee is to get church members and visitors involved in the life of the church. Security Committee News

The Security Committee met on Sunday May 5 and discussed ongoing projects and ideas. The committee is still planning for a fire drill in late July, date have not been determined as of this newsletter. The planned fire drill will take place during the Sunday School hour so that we can all prepare on the best exit route in the event of an emergency. Active shooter training and CPR training is still being planned. The fire safety manual (located in the kitchen) is being updated. Some of the information is out of date. The committee discussed the possibility of adding some emergency preparedness instructions on the church website in the event that someone at the church doesn't know where manuals are located. Also, updating existing and incoming board members with basic security procedures will be implemented going forward.

Preschool Committee News

In the month of May, our preschool welcomed 4 teachers and 17 children from the River Ridge Preschool which closed in April. What a wonderful addition to the school!

Currently, the preschool has registered 54 students for the 24-25 school year. This includes an added class for infants. Space is still available for all classes except the infant's class.

Summer camp begins the second week in June and is full for all three sessions. Though there was enough interest to add sections, the decision was made to keep it small since this is the first time it has been offered in several years.

The Playground Project is a bit delayed. It looks like a September installation so it will not be available at the beginning of the school year. Installation will take 4-6 weeks. Look forward to additional updates.

The Preschool Committee hosted an end of the year cookout for the Preschool Teachers and the NP Staff. Everyone enjoyed hamburgers, hot dogs and all the fixin's. A special thanks to Tim Reynolds for thoroughly cleaning and testing the grill for the event.

Ashley Barron, our director and new member, has worked diligently this year to make our preschool a safe nurturing place for these special young ones to learn about Jesus. With her leadership and guidance, we look forward to a bright future for this ministry.

South Fork Ministry



Missions Committee

In May Kevin and Charity provided a brief update during the mission moment for both the 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. services. They also followed up with a more in-depth update on their mission work in the Middle East during the mission committee meeting on May 19, 2024. Their primary mission is to bring people to know Jesus in the Muslim world.

Also, during the May meeting Dr. Anany Prosper update the committee on the Children's Nutrition Program in Haiti via Zoom. New Philly has been supporting the Children's Nutrition Program for 16 years. Through this program 150,000 people receive medical services, 23,000 receive screening for preventative care and approximately 5,000 children receive healthcare each year. Haiti is the poorest country in the western hemisphere and is primarily ruled by gangs. Please keep Haiti in your prayers,

In June Scott Best, the executive director at Help Our People Eat (HOPE) of Winston Salem provided an update during the mission moment for both the 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. services. He also provided a more in-depth update at the committee meeting later that afternoon. HOPE delivers approximately 1400 meals across 31 distribution points in Winston-Salem. They provide fresh fruits and vegetables in an area of Winston-Salem that is known as a food desert. They host 70 cooking classes for children during 2023 to influence healthy eating habits. They are now producing vegetables in a Hydroponics greenhouse to create a more sustainable source. HOPE also leased 17 acres with 7 greenhouses in Yadkinville. HOPE is changing lives by providing nutritious fruits and vegetables in a food desert, it can be done.


